NECTR 2018 Afterburn Report

Message From The Event Leads

NECTR 2018 was a great success despite some new challenges. We remained the same size this year due to concerns about space for growth and local permitting requirements.

This was probably for the best since one of the largest and unexpected challenges was the wet weather and resulting muddy terrain. This caused many headaches for work weekend volunteers, art setup, and load in/load out. However thanks to the hard work of many dedicated volunteers we persevered and the worst of the muddy areas were mitigated.

There was also an incident during the effigy burn where some fireworks exited the safety perimeter. This led us to identify and address some gaps in our safety procedures and consequently future events will be safer.

For a relatively small event, NECTR has many volunteer shifts to fill. Currently each and every attendee would need to volunteer for at least four hours to fill all the volunteer slots. This year was especially difficult since several participants/volunteers were not able to make it due to the weather/illness. We are looking into ways to address the number of required hours including combining/sharing volunteers across cores and hiring staff to attend the gate during the night.

NECTR continues to grow and change and we are excited to see how it evolves over the next few years especially as more local residents hear about it.

GATE

Core Lead: Gwiddern

Overview

GATE Core is responsible for letting participants in to the event and staffing the GATE shacks overnight in order to be a first point of contact for anyone coming on to the event site.

What Worked

Volunteers were able to stay warm and dry at both gates. We were able to have both gates staffed at all times despite a low volunteer turnout and a lot of cancelled shifts. GATE volunteers required very little supervision compared to previous years.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

Despite having a better volunteer signup rate before the event than ever before, I had more no-shows and cancelled/missed shifts from volunteers than ever before this year. A large number of people signed up for shifts and then did not attend the festival due to weather/health/etc. Key shifts on Friday night were unstaffed as a result so I did a ten-hour overnight GATE shift mostly at the back gate. I needed more crew this year and found it far more difficult to get emergency volunteers at the last minute than during any previous NECTR, even with the megaphone.

I talked to Greeter Core about this up at the Bee Hole on Sunday and we decided that next year we'll work out a process to lend Greeter volunteers to GATE core in the event that we are short-staffed for shifts like this again

Greeters

Core Lead: Sarah R

Overview

Greeter Core is responsible for Greeting participants after they have parked -- informing them about the event and its principles, and giving out advice, maps, and moop bags.

What Worked

People feeling welcome, informed, and most people showing up for shifts.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

There wasn't enough for people to do during their shifts.

DPW

Core Lead: Matt S

Overview

What Worked

Good turnout at work weekends, 2 weekends pre-event seemed to work out fine. Got lucky with willing volunteers to help bridge the bridge(twice) and build pallet bridges.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

1) So the bridge likely should be fastened to the trees, and likely be built on the last work weekend if this is feasible. Some of the pallets need minor repair.

2) To combat the mud we spent a lot of time and some budget on drainage solutions, but these didn't really solve anything. Time/money would likely have better gone into proper bridges through the mud. If they were longer and a few inches wider, with proper support (some pallets disintegrated in the moist), this likely would have made life much easier for load in/load out.

3) The LNT work weekend was kind of a volunteer fail . Only 6 showed, and Thomas and I ended up doing the lion's share of the heavy lifting, including most of the bridge, though Jason helped some, even with an injured knee. We really needed more help, it was a rough day. Suggest we disassemble the bridge Monday (noon) of the event and include this task as a sign up option in the Nectr sign-up board. A formal coordinated LNT sweep could be done that day as well, doing a final pass on the followup weekend.

4) The new burn barrels Mindy donated need better drainage/air flow holes. Once the barrels had ash they weren't burning well. They are also very thin and will likely only last a year or 2 before they rust out.

Rangers

Core Lead: Jon E

Overview

The Rangers Core is responsible for supporting the other cores and the event leads during the event by passing messages, assisting participants, checking in at volunteer stations to make sure things are running smoothly, and being a resource that others can turn to for help mediating conflicts.

What Worked

The new Ranger HQ location was much better due to being a shorter walk on average from any point in the event. Being in the woods also made it easier to shelter HQ from the weather, and being close to several theme camps made it a more enjoyable place to spend time on shift.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

Enough people missed their shifts that we had low or no coverage during some critical times, especially at the beginning and end of the event. We need to figure out how to encourage more participants to volunteer for the Rangers, especially those who can be counted on to be at the event on the first and/or last day.

I need to recruit a co-lead for next year who can assist with the on-the-ground setup and teardown tasks. This year I got assistance from friends and campmates but would like to expand the Ranger organization to make it less of a personal project.

FAST

Core Lead: Mindy S

Overview

The Fire Art Safety Team (FAST) is responsible for ensuring that fire is done safely at the event. The team checks for the safety of flame effects, manages burn perimeters, and ensures that any other fires are attended and safe.

What Worked

Perimeter for both burns was a success. Volunteers for effigy were not as many as last year, but we also always put up the caution tape line which works well. Temple burn overall went very well, it even fell on its own! We had a meeting on site for conclave before effigy burn, Purple Jess volunteered to lead the performance. Weird Jimmy as always was propane safety and inspection.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

Make sure there is a fire spinning/performance lead well ahead of the event. A new process for approving fire effects and their placements during burns. Better clarify what time/how soon before the burns volunteers for perimeter should be in place.

Center Camp

Core Lead: Jill W

Overview

Center Camp provides coffee, hot chocolate, tea and relaxation in a 24 hour space for all participants. Center Camp is staffed by two volunteers from 7am to 11pm each day.

What Worked

Plenty of coffee/tea supplies, plenty of battery power, more balls, space stayed nice and dry. Participants enjoyed the extra large ball pit, hookah, and chill space.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

One responder preferred traditional tables and chairs to lounge spaces. People not being sure how to turn on the water and water being "off" in the mornings. A few participants noted that groups who "gift" food at Center Camp often take over stoves and leave large amounts of food behind. We had a few shifts completely empty, mostly due to weather (no one showed for Thursday shifts due to delayed arrivals).

Trail Lighting

Core Lead: Jordan

Overview

Trail Lighting Core is responsible for installing and removing lights along the trails in sections that aren't lit by theme camps.

What Worked

Volunteers were dedicated, the new lights did not fail in copious amounts of mud and water, and persisted (provisional statement, see 'biggest problem' below) "always on" for the full length of the event. Also theme camps did a pretty great job lighting the space outside their camps, I wasn't sure how this would go but I thought it was successful (and beautiful).

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

The biggest issue was people (rangers, attendees) turning off the lights during the day instead of simply leaving them on. This made them harder to find at dusk, and resulted in dark spots at night. I did many laps and found lights that were turned off in problem spots that were intended to have been left on. When I encountered people turning the trail lights off during the day, I got the same answer every time: ""Just trying to be helpfu!"

Later in the weekend, going around and turning them on during the day helped, but even in this scenario people would turn them off before dusk.

Secondary issues:

Volunteers getting creative with the fashion in which trail lights were strung up, making them difficult to remove on Monday and in some cases incurring minor damage. Examples of this would be winding them elaborately around trees, running them back and forth through natural terrain, hooking them on barbed wire in one case.

Improvement: The biggest this is probably sending out a couple blasts to the community letting them know to please, please not touch the trail lights. Did I say please? Since I doubt that would be enough to prevent the issue described above, I would like to modify the battery boxes in some fashion to suggest 'do not touch'.

Secondary improvements:

Make the lights even prettier without inducing a ton of extra labor

Art Grants

Core Lead: Sarah F

Overview

Art Grant Core is responsible for running the art grant process and helping artists bring their art to the event.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

In the future we should seek out artists that are more in need of grants to award them to, since this year a number of artists didn't even seek to be reimbursed for their expenses. We may also try different methods of disbursing money by letting members of the art grant committee have a share of funds to direct rather than just voting yes or no to each grant proposal.

Trail Signs

Core Lead: Amy H

Overview

The Trail Signs core is responsible for designing, building, installing, and uninstalling the signs that mark the trails throughout the NECTR site.

What Worked


Collaboration with trail lighting went well, resulting in easy-to-read signs. Signs were placed in more visible locations this year.

What Didn't Work / Lessons Learned

Some of the trails that were more affected by the rain/mud didn't get marked or lit very well. It's a lot of work to remake the signs every year, so I'm working on a design for reusable sign posts so only the street name portion will need to be remade every year.

Financials


NECTR's primary expenditures include the land reservation, art grants, and event insurance which is consistent across most regional event budgets. Each year, we continue to spend more on porta potties for our increased population. Along with minor infrastructure purchases, this year we purchased a trailer for on-site storage of NECTR infrastructure, which will help make organizing the event significantly easier. We continue to be under budget for art grants, as not all of the grants awarded ended up being funded. With the purchase of the trailer, NECTRs bank balance is steady since 2017, with just over \$21.5K, which will allow for an increased art budget, including effigy and temple for the 2019 event. The majority of surplus remains in the bank as recommended for unforeseen emergencies, including those relating to last minute venue changes. The summaries below include spending trends from 2014 onwards, including a detailed breakdown of costs for the 2018 event.





Following the event, a survey was conducted to collect feedback from the participants to see how the event went. We received 106 responses out of a total of approximately 300 participants.






How many times to the Big Burn

I felt safe at NECTR


Note: For responses where the individual replied that they felt unsafe, a secondary form asked for additional information. All of these responses had to do with the fireworks used in the Effigy.

What improvements would you like to see leading up to the event?



What should NECTRs budget NOT go towards?





Weather @ NECTR

Every year seems to present us with new weather. It can be warmer and we have more bees, it can be colder and there's snow. This year: It was wet. And muddy. Very muddy.


How was the temperature?

More Snow, Bees or Mud?






This year NECTR was held from October 11 to 15. When would you like to see it held next year?




Map made it easy to find my camp

General Feedback on the Event

44 responses - 8 selected and summarized, except for the last one which was included for verbosity sake.

Lamb of god



Placement this year for sound camps were perfect!


Seemed a pretty low dancing event. I'd also really like to see a fire circle/place for fire spinning.


Note: A couple comments on the feedback provided on Art & Music.






What COREs did you volunteer with?


4-5 hr shifts seem too Long a commitment. I would have signed up for more 2-3 hr shifts.

Don't let people sign up for shifts before ticketing them


Need more information about the "job description" at volunteer sign-up site.




Gender
